Shotley Pier Update

It's still quiet at the pier as we progress slowly to a planning decision, with a site visit booked for Wednesday 15th August, and the planning committee decision on Wednesday 22nd August.

Share certificates are ready at last. Volunteers will be hand delivering as many as possible locally, and posting the ones that are far afield, as well as emailing the ones that were requested by pdf email.

Also, we will have some to hand out in the Committee Room, Shotley Village Hall on Saturday 1st September, between 10am and 12noon, the same day as the Village Flower and Vegetable show, so if you go into the main hall there will be Flower and vegetables everywhere. Norman has kindly said you can go through and enjoy the displays too, or use the side entrance to the committee room, which is the path up to the left of the hall. We will be in the committee room with share certificates at the ready.

With your share certificate, you will receive a Nominee form to tell us who should inherit your community shares. If you fill in this form, the community shares can be transferred outside of probate. You can leave them to a person or more than one person, or to a group as long as it has a constitution.

As share certificates start to be issued to our 520 investors, one special group in Holland were having a very special family reunion, and our volunteer Casper took the opportunity to present certificates to all those he had persuaded to take part in our community share issue.

Clan Holland, as we call them, are all related to Casper de Boer who has lived in Shotley for many years, becoming a well known Dutch settler. He has enthusiastically introduced the idea of sharing ownership of the pier with his clan, and we are looking forward to putting a cluster of celebratory plaques up for them.

We arranged a boat trip round the pier for some of Uncle Casper's relatives. They visit every year and enjoyed our Living History event in 2017. Having seen the pier each time they visited getting gradually more dilapidated, they are delighted to be part of its rescue all the way from Holland.

The Board has always wanted to celebrate the personal stories of people who care about the pier. We've teamed up with author Robert Ashton, for whom this will be his 20th published book. As a child, Robert lived at Brantham and so used to visit the pier himself more than 50 years ago. His book will be an exploration into the pier's past, its present, and the hopes people have for its future.

He's describing the book, which will be titled 'River of Hope' as a collective biography, sharing the stories of those he meets or speaks to, both by design and also by chance. Robert takes his inspiration from George Ewart Evans, who wrote about rural Suffolk before the Great War. He too wrote the stories of people he met, capturing them before they were lost.

Robert is currently researching the book and conducting interviews, some face to face and some over the phone.
